2019-0009 Harris Enterprise Resource Planning - Annual Software Maintenance

The Harris ERP/Innoprise software annual maintenance is due for renewal. Staff is requesting approval in the amount of \$62,650.93 for this service effective February 1, 2019, to January 31, 2020.

The Harris ERP/Innoprise software consists of core financials and payroll, utility billing, building permits, business licenses, code enforcement and online bill pay for utility billing. Fees have been prorated for a period of six months for the building permits, code enforcement and business license modules in anticipation of the Tyler Energov system go-live in July. Contractually, there has been no increase in maintenance fees for years 2012 through 2017. Maintenance fees have increased by 4% for 2019.

I move to approve the Harris ERP annual software maintenance at a cost not to exceed \$62,650.93.

2019-0047 Granicus Three Year Contract Extension for Legistar, Legistar InSite, Government Transparency Suite, and Granicus Encoding Appliance Software Renewal Subscriptions

Legistar is an Online Cloud application that provides a comprehensive, integrated document management and information retrieval system designed specifically to support the legislative process, including meeting agendas, minutes of meetings, journals of proceedings, subject matter indexes and reports.

In 2018, our Granicus services were enhanced to include live in-meeting functions using their Government Transparency Suite Software.

Granicus recommended we co-term our billing expiration with a contract end date, and staff is requesting approval of this co-term along with contract extension through January 31, 2022.

The following is a breakdown year over year: 2/1/2019 to 1/31/2020 \$14,910.62; 2/1/2020 to1/31/2021 \$15,357.94; 2/1/2021 to 1/31/2022 \$15,818.68.

I move to approve a three year service agreement with Granicus, Inc.;

2019-0076 Upgrade of Village Network Core Switching Equipment

The Village is in need of upgrading its core network switching equipment with new technology that can meet the bandwidth and security demands of modern computing.

The Villages network backbone consists of several switching devices connected via both fiber optic and copper cable. The backbone of the network extends from the Village Hall campus, through to the Police Department and down to Public Works. Several of these switching devices have reached end of life support. In addition, some older devices cannot meet the processing needs put upon them which leads to bottlenecks and the decline of data transmission.

BIS staff has researched various switching manufactures and methods that can afford high speed data transfer of at least 10 Gigabyte and enhance data security. Staff is recommending a solution that includes upgrading the core switching hardware, software and security functions of the system.

Sentinel Technologies of Downers Grove Illinois has a continual business relationship with the Village and also has a working knowledge of Village and Police Department computer security. Staff has also worked with Sentinel Technologies to obtain pricing and training credits for the proposed equipment upgrade.

The proposed upgrade consists of new Internet firewalls, access and aggregation switches, hardware and software support as well as subscription based updating services.

I move to approve the purchase of the Upgrade of Village Network Core Switching Equipment from Sentinel Technologies of Downers Grove Illinois in an amount not to exceed \$100,195 plus a 5% contingency.

2019-0066 SportsPlex Indoor Soccer Field Replacement - Proposal

The Sportsplex, located at 11351 W. 159th Street was opened in 2003. The existing indoor soccer field turf is original to the construction. The synthetic turf is 15 years old and has surpassed its useful expected life of about 10 years. Unrepairable failures have occurred at the seams and are creating potential safety issues. Over the past few months, Recreation Department staff investigated area synthetic soccer fields and identified two companies, FieldTurf USA, Inc. of Calhoun, Georgia and All Sports Enterprises of Exton, Pennsylvania that provide a

quality product suited for the existing synthetic turf replacement.

The Village is a member of Sourcewell, formerly National Joint Powers Alliance (NJPA), a purchasing cooperative that provides a competitive procurement process. As a member of Sourcewell, the Village is eligible to contract the synthetic turf material and installation through the cooperative.

Staff requested proposals from two vendors. Additional producers of this type of sports field surface were unable to be identified. All Sports Enterprises of Exton, Pennsylvania submitted a proposal in an amount of \$146,715.00. FieldTurf USA, Inc. of Calhoun, Georgia submitted a proposal in an amount of \$110,803.37.

The two vendors also made presentations of their products to a panel comprised of Recreation and Public Works staff. Staff reviewed the products provided by the two vendors and checked with references where the products have been installed, including the Carl Sandburg High School Athletic Director. Staff also communicated with Orland Park Soccer Club representatives to get their input on the type of surface best suited for their usage.

After considering stakeholder feedback, reference feedback and cost, staff recommends accepting the proposal from FieldTurf USA, Inc. of Calhoun, Georgia in the amount of \$110,803.37, plus a contingency for spot replacement of padding in the amount of \$5,000.00, for a total cost of \$115,803.37.

I move to approve accepting the Sourcewell proposal for SportsPlex Indoor Soccer Field Turf Replacement from FieldTurf USA, Inc. of Calhoun, Georgia in an amount not to exceed \$115,803.37 (\$110,803.37 plus \$5,000.00 contingency).

2019-0050 Disposal of Village Equipment (Online Auction) - Equipment from Public Works Department, Orland Health & Fitness and Police Department - Ordinance

The Village's Public Works Department is requesting that the Village declare the following equipment described below as surplus property and dispose of through Public Surplus.com (online auction). These items are no longer necessary or useful for the Village of Orland Park.

-One (1) lot of two (2) weapon storage cabinets and one (1) expandable weapon rack. The dimensions of the storage cabinets are 42" wide X 65" tall X 15" deep. The expandable gun rack dimensions are 41" wide X 7' tall. "DASCO" Storage Solutions is the manufacturer of both items.

-One lot of five (5) used parking lot light pole heads manufactured by Cooper lighting, catalog #WS40, 400WATTS, 120V, 4.3 rated. All housings are brown in color.

-One (1) used five shelf A/V cart by Luxor. Model/serial is N/A. 56" tall, 32" wide, 27.5" deep.

-One (1) used TA Adler/Royal electric typewriter, model # AE-800. Serial is N/A

-One (1) used office desk by HON, model/serial unknown.

-One (1) used Belfour, Inc. scale pad, model# GB1816A, serial# 0107GB0809

-One (1) used 36" round 29" tall office table, with a decal bearing Bevis Custom Furniture

-One (1) used 36" round 29" tall wooden office table. Make/Model Serial is N/A.

In order to legally dispose of municipal property, the Village must adopt an ordinance that describes the items to be sold.

In the event that two (2) attempts have been made to sell said property, and that no bids have been received equal to the minimum price, the property shall be either donated or scrapped as determined by the Village Manager.

2019-0065 Annual Traffic Signal Maintenance for Village/ State/County Roadways - Proposal

As part of the Village intergovernmental agreements with the State and County, the Village is responsible for shared costs of traffic signals maintenance on State and County roadways. The portion that we are responsible for is determined by the jurisdictional portion of the intersecting streets. For instance, on 151st St and Route 45, the Village pays for 50% of the cost of maintenance because of 151st St. east and west of Rte. 45 are owned by the Village. The county has the same formula for maintenance costs on shared jurisdiction roadways.

Additionally, the Public Works Department contracts out the preventative maintenance for the thirteen (13) solely Village owned traffic control signal systems. The Village has traditionally utilized the same contractor that performs this work for the State and County as part of their bid procedure.

The contractor selected by both the State and County for 2019 is Meade Electric of McCook, IL. Meade has performed this work for the state, county, and Village for many years. Meade has submitted the attached proposal agreeing to hold last year's rates (\$159 per intersection each month) through 2019.

Staff recommends extending the contract for another year. The proposal provides the same timeframe and similar level of maintenance service that Meade provides under the State and County agreements. The cost of repairs due to damage or failure is above and beyond the scope of this proposal and is determined on a case by case basis.

I move to approve the 2019 expenditures to the State of Illinois for traffic signal maintenance on shared State roadways;

And

Approve the 2019 expenditures to the Cook County Highway Department for traffic signal maintenance on shared County roadways;

And

Approve waiving the bid process for village traffic signal maintenance service;

And

Approve accepting the proposal from Meade Electric Company, Inc. of McCook, Illinois, for traffic signal maintenance for the thirteen (13) village owned traffic signals at a cost not to exceed the Board approved budgeted amount for 2019.

This matter was APPROVED on the Consent Agenda.

2019-0063 Sensus Water Meter Related Products - Purchase

In 2013 the Public Works Utility Division initiated the installation of SmartPoint transmitters and Sensus iPerl water meters. To date more than 17,885 SmartPoint conversions have been completed throughout the Village.

SmartPoint transmitters replace the previous MXU transmitter and are necessary for fixed point meter reading, allowing staff to get meter readings without leaving the office. Village staff is scheduled to complete the SmartPoint conversion program in 2019.

The Village has also been working with M.E. Simpson Company of Valparaiso, Indiana for large and small water meter testing. Numerous small water meters are removed annually for bench testing to monitor system reliability. Upon removal Village staff will replace the meter with a new Sensus iPerl or appropriate meter replacement, as needed. Sensus iPerl meters (3/4" & 1") are also installed for all new construction.

The Village budgets annually to install Smartpoint upgrades and replace and install new water meters. For FY2019 there has been \$120,000 budgeted for Smartpoint transmitter conversions and \$125,000 budgeted for new and replacement meters. Sensus products are distributed by territories through authorized dealers only.

The local authorized vendor for Sensus products in our area is Core & Main of Mokena, Illinois.

I move to approve authorizing the purchase of Sensus water meter related products including SmartPoint Transmitters and water meters from Core & Main of Mokena, Illinois in an amount not to exceed the Board approved budgeted amount.

This matter was APPROVED on the Consent Agenda.

2019-0049 Maintenance and Upgrade of Harlem Avenue Street Lights from 151st Street to 159th Street Including Underground Wiring and Controller Replacement and the Addition of Holiday Lighting Circuits - Proposal to Increase Scope of Work

The street lighting system along Harlem Avenue was installed over 30 years ago. There are approximately 43 light poles supporting HPS luminaires at 40 ft. mounting height between 151st Street and 159th Street. The light poles are placed in a staggered pattern along each side of the street. All of these lights are served and controlled by a single lighting control cabinet located near the center of the segment at the Wheeler Drive intersection.

Due to compromised reliability and maintenance challenges related to this aging infrastructure, on June 19, 2017, V3 Companies of Woodridge, Illinois was awarded a \$26,000 contract to engineer, create bid specifications and IDOT permitting to replace the lighting control system and all existing underground wiring. In conjunction with this work, the addition of a holiday lighting circuit will be included along with the installation of a weatherproof receptacle at each light pole consistent with the commercial corridors on LaGrange Road.

Following the recent conversion of Orland Park's residential street lighting to LED technology, staff requested and reviewed a proposal from V3 to increase the scope of this project to include replacement LED luminaires. V3 Companies would provide all necessary documentation (including a photometric analysis report) required for IDOT permitting for a lump sum fee of \$6,000, increasing the value of this contract from \$26,000 to \$32,000.

I move to approve an increase in the scope of work for the maintenance and upgrade of Harlem Avenue street lights from 151st Street to 159th Street including underground wiring and controller replacement and the addition of holiday lighting circuits with V3 Companies of Woodridge, Illinois for inclusion of LED luminaires in the amount of \$6,000.00.

This matter was APPROVED on the Consent Agenda.

2019-0064 Elevated Tank 5 Fiber Duct Extension - Proposal

As the Village of Orland Park continues advancements with technology, there is a greater need to reliably transmit more data and information through the network

and to create more access points throughout the system. Security cameras, alarm systems, access control, and monitoring equipment are critical components of the Village's technology base. These services depend on network connections with large bandwidth to transmit data and receive software updates.

Current radio networks used by Police and Public Works Departments rely heavily on wireless networks, however; because of their limited bandwidth, they do not fulfill every need of the village. Extending fiber to the outer edges of the village decreases the wireless systems transmit distance and increases its reliability while providing more bandwidth for more technology. All village departments utilizing phones, laptops, and tablets can rely on a fiber connection when used with a Wi-Fi access point to securely and efficiently conduct business.

Currently, the Village has two projects that are moving forward, Elevated Tank #5 Restoration in 2019 and the Spur 2 Water Main installation within the next few years. Elevated Tank #5 has been identified as a desirable location to integrate within the Village network via a fiber connection. Improvements planned for Tank #5 include accommodations for fiber and the ability to better house new technology within the base of the Tank.

The Spur 2 routing extends east from the Main Pump Station and will rely mostly on Wheeler Drive and the ComEd right-of-way that parallels Wheeler Drive to approximately 73rd Street, less than 2 blocks away from Elevated Tank #5. During installation of the new watermain, the opportunity to parallel the installation of a 4" fiber duct from the Main Pump Station to Elevated Tank #5 would result in significant savings for the village with design, installation and restoration costs when compared to handling the projects separately. Greeley and Hansen of Chicago, Illinois, the engineering company overseeing the Spur 2 project has been asked to provide additional engineering and construction oversight of the 4" fiber duct during the construction of Spur 2. Greeley and Hansen submitted their proposal with a not to exceed cost of \$39,500.00 to perform the additional work if conducted in conjunction with the Spur 2 project.

I move to approve accepting the proposal from Greeley and Hansen of Chicago, Illinois for the Elevated Tank 5 Fiber Duct Extension at a cost not to exceed \$39,500.00.

This matter was APPROVED on the Consent Agenda.

2019-0007 Hey and Associates, Inc. - Plan Review and Landscape Architect Services 2019 Contract Adjustment

On September 4, 2018, the Village Board approved a contract with Hey and Associates not to exceed \$40,000.00 and extended their contract for an additional three (3) years, ending on December 31, 2021. Since then, the Village has requested that Hey and Associates work with the Village to create a master landscape plan for the entire Fredrick T. Owens Village Hall Campus.

The cost for this work is an additional \$5,000.00. The master plan will be a joint project between the Development Services Department, Parks Department, and Village Manager's Office and will be used to guide future landscape projects for the Village Center campus.

I move to approve an adjustment to the 2019 contract with Hey and Associates, Inc. for landscape plan review and landscape architect services from \$40,000 to an amount not to exceed \$45,000.

This matter was APPROVED on the Consent Agenda.

2019-0020 Orland Park Nature Center Upland Design Additional Services #4

On December 18, 2017, the Village Board awarded the Orland Park Nature Center site improvements construction contract to Hacienda Landscaping, the lowest bidder on the project (approximately \$400,000 lower). The IIIFFC (Indiana, Illinois, and Iowa Foundation for Fair Contracting) filed a bid protest questioning the Hacienda bid. However, Hacienda met Village bid requirements and the Village had no basis to deny them the award of the Nature Center project.

During construction of the project, the IIIFFC has visited and monitored the site during construction. Since the Hacienda contract was awarded, the Village has also complied with five separate FOIA requests providing all Nature Center communications between the Village and Hacienda. The construction of the Nature Center is now substantially complete; however, there is still some work needed to finalize the project, including installation of plant material, site signage, viewing scopes, etc. according to Upland Design, the contractor and their subs still have some work to do before a punch list can be created, as well as outstanding pay application paperwork to be processed.

The remaining work requires a high level of understanding of the unique specifics of this project, and review consistency is important as the project is finalized. Due to the complexities of this unique project, as well as the outside interest on the Hacienda bid award, staff recommends the approval of these final construction observation costs. Upland Design has requested approval for 44 additional hours of work in the amount of \$5,896.

Staff is requesting this amount be increased to \$10,000 to avoid having to return to the Board to cover minor unanticipated items that may arise during the punch list reviews and project close-out phases. All of the additional work will be completed only as needed per staff direction on an hourly basis. Most of the additional work will continue to be done by Heath Wright, an Upland Design licensed Landscape Architect with extensive park construction experience, who has done most of the Nature Center inspections to date.

I move to approve the authorization of Extra Work Authorization #4 not to exceed \$10,000, for additional Upland Design Inc. work including but not limited to site visits, reports, punch list preparation, project coordination, vendor contact and

review of contractor pay applications and project close-out, as needed per Village staff direction.

2019-0048 SB Friedman Development Advisors Proposal - Downtown Main Street Triangle Master Development Agreement - Addendum #1

SB Friedman assisted the Village in the review of the proposals for the Downtown Main Street Triangle RFP. They specifically reviewed the proposals as they related to financial terms, fiscal impacts, and other related matters. This review and analysis, combined with the selection committee input, assisted the Village Board in their final selection of Structured Development.

SB Friedman has and continues to assist the Village in evaluating the financial, operational, performance, compliance and other key terms of the master development agreement as negotiations progress with Structured Development. Village staff requests \$25,000 of funding for a contract adjustment with SB Friedman so that they may be retained through the completion of the negotiations.

I move to approve the additional \$25,000 for SB Friedman Development Advisors contract for their assistance in evaluating the Downtown Main Street Triangle Master Development Agreement.

This matter was APPROVED on the Consent Agenda.

2019-0023 Phase 1 Design Engineering for Multi-Use Path Along 167th Street (Wolf Road to 104th Avenue)

In 2017, Village staff performed a preliminary study of constructing a multi-use path along 167th Street from just west of Wolf Road to 104th Street. After determining it was feasible, the Village proceeded with applying for Invest in Cook grant funds; however, the Village did not get the grant awarded. In order to improve the possibility of grant funding in the future, for the project, the Village is proposing to have a Phase 1 Engineering Design completed by V3 Companies. The completion of Phase 1 Engineering will increase the chances of the Village receiving funding for the Phase 2 (Design Engineering), Phase 3 (Construction Engineering) and other construction stages of the project. V3 Companies completed the preliminary study and the documents needed to be used for the Invest in Cook Grant application. Based upon their previous knowledge and work already completed, staff is recommending them as the project engineer for the Phase 1 Engineering.

With the completion of this path segment, pedestrian access will extend the reach of the existing multi-use path system to the southern portion of the village, where it is currently lacking. For example, this would create path connectivity to significant destination points such as: the Grasslands, Centennial Park, Village Hall and downtown train station from the southern portion of the village. Completion of 167th Street multi-use path would also connect 25 subdivisions to the current Village multi-use path system through existing sidewalks and paths within the Village.

I move to approve the contract for V3 Companies to complete preliminary engineering for the 167th Street Multi-Use path from Wolf Road to 104th Avenue, in the amount of \$211,000 and authorize the Village Manager to execute the contract.

2019-0043 Adoption of 2017 NEC Electrical Code - Ordinance

The Development Services Department has reviewed the latest (2017) edition of the National Electrical Code (NEC) as written by the National Fire Protection Agency (NFPA) for code updates and has inserted to our existing local ordinances (revisions) in the appropriate code sections of the new 2017/ NEC. Revisions to Title 5, Chapter 3 of the Village Code are attached.

The Village of Orland Park currently utilizes the 2014 edition of the National Electrical Code (NEC) as the basis for its electrical regulations of construction elements including but not limited to: wiring methods and procedures, equipment, fire alarms, & circuitry. This is a national model code written by experts in 3year cycles that are used for reference. The Illinois Capital Development Board has been notified of Orland Park's intention to add new electrical code amendments as required to Title 5, Chapter 3 of the Village Code.

The local changes to the present code are limited in nature and have been presented and approved by the Village of Orland Park Electrical Commission established per Title 2, Chapter 4 of the Village Code. The local revisions are intended to clarify existing rules and to remove outdated amended construction standards. Building Division staff has highlighted the code changes for your review and will provide answers to any questions by Building Division personnel.

2019-0027 2017 Adoption of the F.D.A Health Code & Village Amendments - Ordinance

The Village of Orland Park currently uses the "2013 Food Code from the FDA".

The Illinois Department of Public Health has amended Title 77 Illinois Administrative Code Part 750 to adopt the 2017 Food Code. The FDA 2017 Food Code was revised to eliminate the scoring system.

The Development Services Department has reviewed these new regulations and is proposing amendments and revisions to the Village Code Title 6 Chapter 1 Health Code to correlate with the change in language and rating system enacted by IDPH in its adoption of the 2017 Food Code.

On January 21, 2019, this item was reviewed by the Development Services Planning & Engineering Committee. Items were discussed as to the reasons surrounding the elimination of the point rating system and the created pass/fail system. Staff indicated that there will be three specific levels of violations that are now part of the federal 2017 FDA code. These levels will be the deciding factor on the pass / fail system to give the inspector immediate opportunity to remediate a violation at the establishment. After discussion the Committee had no additional concerns or questions and this item was recommended for approval and referred to the Village Board of Trustees for consideration.

The police department is seeking to amend Title 9, Chapter 3, Section 9-3-5 of the Orland Park Village Code, SEAT SAFETY BELTS AND CHILD RESTRAINT SYSTEMS to reflect the changes in the Illinois Vehicle Code pertaining to the age of a child required to being secured in a child restraint system from four to under eight (8) years of age.

On February 4, 2019, this item was reviewed and approved by the Public Safety Committee and referred to the Village Board for approval.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE 9, CHAPTER 3, SECTION 9-3-5 OF THE ORLAND PARK VILLAGE CODE IN REGARD TO (SEAT SAFETY BELTS AND CHILD RESTRAINT SYSTEMS)

..Body

WHEREAS, the Village President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Orland Park (the "Village") have the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that pertain to the Village's government and affairs and to protect the public health, safety and welfare of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, the Village deems it necessary and appropriate to provide for the safety of children riding as passengers in motor vehicles; and

WHEREAS, the Village has determined that the Village Code amendments set forth below are necessary to reflect recent amendments to the Illinois Child Passenger Protection Act (625 ILCS 25/I, et seq.) and are in the best interests of the Village and its residents.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Orland Park, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, as follows:

SECTION 1

Title 9, Chapter 3, Section 9-3-5, Subsections E, F, G, H and I are amended in their entirety to provide as follows:

"E. Each driver and passenger of a motor vehicle operated on a roadway, street or highway within the Village shall wear a properly fastened and adjusted seat safety belt (625 ILCS 5/12-603.1 (a); except that a child less than 8 years of age shall be protected as required pursuant to the Child Passenger Protection Act. (625 ILCS 5/25-1 et seq.) Each driver of a motor vehicle transporting a child eight (8) years of age or older, but less than sixteen (16) years of age, in the front seat of the motor vehicle shall secure the child in a properly fastened and secured seat safety belt.

F. When any person is transporting a child in the Village under eight (8) years of age in a noncommercial motor vehicle of the first division, a motor vehicle of the second division with a gross vehicle weight rating of 9,000 pounds or less, or a recreational vehicle, on the roadways, streets or highways in the Village, such person shall be responsible for providing protection of such child by properly securing him or her in a child restraint system. The parent or legal guardian of a child under eight (8) years of age shall provide a child restraint system to any person who transports his or her child. Any person who transports the child of another shall not be found to be in violation of this subsection unless a child restraint system was provided to said person by the parent or legal guardian of the child, but was not used to transport the child. G. Every person, when transporting a child eight (8) years of age or older but under sixteen (16) years of age, in a motor vehicle within the Village, shall be responsible for securing that child in either a child restraint system or a properly fastened and secured seat safety belt.

H. Every person under the age of eighteen (18) years, when transporting a child eight (8) years of age or older but under the age of eighteen (18) years, in a motor vehicle within the Village, shall be responsible for securing that child in a properly adjusted and fastened seat safety belt.

I. The provisions of subsection E above shall not apply to any of the following:

- 1. A driver or passenger frequently stopping and leaving the motor vehicle or delivering property from the motor vehicle, if the speed of the motor vehicle between stops does not exceed fifteen (15) miles per hour.
- 2. A driver or passenger possessing a written statement from a physician that such person is unable, for medical or physical reasons, to wear a seat safety belt.
- 3. A driver or passenger possessing an official certificate or license endorsement issued by the appropriate agency in another state or country indicating that the driver is unable for medical, physical, or other valid reasons to wear a seat safety belt.
- 4. A driver operating a motor vehicle in reverse.
- 5. A motor vehicle with a model year prior to 1965
- 6. A motorcycle, motor driven cycle.
- 7. A moped.
- 8. A motor vehicle which is not required to be equipped with seat safety belts under federal law.
- 9. A motor vehicle operated by a rural letter carrier duly employed by the United States Postal Service while engaged in the performance of his or her duties as a rural letter carrier.
- 10. A back seat passenger of a taxicab".

SECTION 2:

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption and publication in pamphlet form as provided by law.

BACKGROUND:

On 1/18/09, the Village Board passed the Crime Free Rental Housing Ordinance which was later amended on 1/9/15. The ordinance regulated the rental housing market and requires the property owners to register their rental properties; attend a training class to familiarize themselves with the ordinance and the best practices for crime free rental housing. It also included provisions to require property owners to address criminal activity in rented units to include eviction of a tenant involved in criminal activity on the property. The ordinance was vetted by the village with input from the ACLU, Shiver Center on Property Law and our local realtor's association.

This proposed ordinance is similar and involves repeated acts of criminal activity which the owners or occupants of the property engages in or allows or enables certain repeated acts of criminal or illegal activity to occur on the property. The criminal acts are identified in Section 2, 8-6-14 (B) (1) a through t.

In summary, the ordinance allows the Chief of Police to notify in writing property owners if it has been determined that the property has been a nuisance property and requests the owner to propose a course of action to abate the nuisance activity.

Failure of the property owner to respond to the request or abate the nuisance allows the village to seek compliance through the Circuit Court of Cook County that may impose fines, penalties up to closure of the property.

On February 4, 2019, this item was reviewed and approved by the Public Safety Committee and referred to the Village Board for approval.

The village may not take any unilateral action against the property owners insuring due process through the courts.

WHEREAS, the Village President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Orland Park (the "Village") have the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that pertain to its government and affairs and protect the public health, safety, and welfare of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 65 ILCS 5/1-2-1, the Village may pass all ordinances and make all rules and regulations proper or necessary, to carry into effect the powers granted to municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the Village deems it to be in the best interest of the public to regulate real property where the owner or occupant of the real property engages in, allows or enables criminal or illegal activity to occur on or near the real property.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Orland Park, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, and pursuant to its home rule powers, as follows:

SECTION 1

The above recitals are incorporated herein by reference as though fully set forth herein.

SECTION 2

Title 8, Chapter 6, of the Orland Park Village Code is amended by adding a new Section 8-6-14, which shall read in its entirety as follows:

"8-6-14: CHRONIC NUISANCES:

A. Any real property within the Village which becomes a chronic nuisance property is in violation of this Section and is subject to its remedies. Any person in charge who permits real property under his or her ownership or control to be a chronic nuisance property shall be in violation of this Section and subject to its remedies and penalties, as well as the penalties provided for in Section 8-6-99 of this Chapter.

B. Definitions.

1. Chronic nuisance property upon which either two or more of the following criminal activities have occurred during any 60-day period or three (3) or more of the following criminal activities have occurred during any 365-day period, as a result of separate factual events that have been independently investigated by a law enforcement agency:

- a. Disorderly conduct as defined in 720 ILCS 5/26-1, as amended;
- b. Unlawful use of weapons as defined in 720 ILCS 5/24-1 et seq., as amended;
- c. Mob action as defined in 720 ILCS 5/25-1, as amended;
- d. Discharge of a firearm as defined in 720 5/24-1.2 et seq., as amended;
- e.Gambling as defined in 720 ILCS 5/28-1, as amended;
- f. Possession, manufacture or delivery of a controlled substance, a counterfeit substance or a controlled substance analog, as defined in 720 ILCS 570/401 et seq., as amended;
- g. Possession, cultivation, manufacture or delivery of cannabis as defined in 720 ILCS 550/1 et seq., as amended;
- h. Possession, manufacture or delivery of controlled substances as defined in the Illinois Controlled Substances Act, 720 ILCS 570/401 et seq., as amended;
- i. Sale, delivery or possession of drug paraphernalia, as defined in 720 ILCS 600/3 and 3.5, as amended
- j. Possession, manufacture, or delivery of methamphetamine as defined in the Methamphetamine Control and Community Protection Act, 720 ILCS 646/1 et seq., as amended
- k. Any offense involving the use, sale or delivery of intoxicating compounds as defined in the Use of Intoxicating Compounds Act, 720 ILCS 690/.01 et seq., as amended
- 1. Assault or battery or any related offense as defined in 720 ILCS 5/12-1 et seq., 5/12-2 et seq., 5/12-3, or 5/12-4 et seq., as amended;
- m. Sexual abuse or related offenses as defined in 720 ILCS 5/12-15 et seq., or 5/12-16 et seq., as amended;
- n. Public indecency as defined in 720 ILCS 5/11-9 et seq., as amended;
- o. Sexual exploitation of a child as defined in 720 ILCS 5/11-9.1, as amended;
- p. Prostitution as defined in 720 ILCS 5/11-14 et seq., as amended;
- q. Criminal damage to property as defined in 720 ILCS 5/21-1 et seq., as amended;
- r. Illegal consumption or possession of alcohol, as defined in 235 ILCS 5/1 et seq., as amended;
- s. A violation of a provision the Village Code relating to disorderly conduct, assault, battery, unlawful use of a weapon, possession or cannabis, possession of drug paraphernalia, underage consumption of alcohol, disposal of garbage/refuse/solid waste and/or noise regulations; and
- t. A violation of Title 5 Chapter 7 (Property Maintenance) or Title 5 Chapter 1 (Building Code) of the Village Code.

2. Control. The ability to regulate, restrain, dominate, counteract or govern conduct that occurs on property.

3. Owner. Any person, agent, firm or corporation having any legal or equitable interest in the property. Owner includes, but is not limited to, a mortgagee in

possession in whom is vested all or part of the legal title to the property or all or part of the beneficial ownership and the right to the present use and enjoyment of the premises; or an occupant who can control what occurs on the property.

4. Permit. To suffer, allow, consent to, acquiesce by failure to prevent, or expressly ascent [assent] or agree to the doing of an act.

5. Person. Any natural person, association, limited liability company, partnership or corporation capable of owning or using property in the Village.

6. Person in charge. Any person in actual or constructive possession of a property, including but not limited to an owner, occupant of property under his or her domain, ownership or control.

7. Property. Any real property, including land which is affixed, incidental or pertinent to the land, including but not limited to any premises, room, house, building, or structure or any separate part or portion thereof.

C. Commencement of action. When the chief of police receives a report documenting the occurrence of the second nuisance activity in a 60-day period or the third nuisance activity in a 365-day period at or within a property and determines that the property has become a chronic nuisance property pursuant to this Section, the Chief of Police shall:

1. Notify the person in charge in writing that the property has been determined to be a chronic nuisance property. The notice shall contain the following information: the street address or legal description sufficient for identification of the property; a statement that the Chief of Police has determined the property to be chronic nuisance property with a concise description of the nuisance activities leading to his/her findings; and a demand that the person in charge respond within ten (10) days to the Chief of Police and propose a course of action that the Chief of Police agrees will abate the nuisance activities giving rise to the violation.

2. Service shall be made either personally or by certified mail, postage pre-paid, return receipt requested, addressed to the person in charge at the address of the property believed to be a chronic nuisance property, or such other place which is likely to give the person in charge notice of the determination by the Chief of Police.

3. A copy of the notice shall be served on the owner at such address as shown on the tax rolls of the county in which the property is located, and/or the occupant, at the address of the property, if these persons are different from the person in charge, and shall be made either personally or by certified mail, postage pre-paid, return receipt requested.

4. A copy of the notice shall also be posted at the property after ten (10) days has elapsed from the service or mailing of the notice to the person in charge if the person in charge has not subsequently contacted the Chief of Police.

5. The failure of any person to receive notice that the property may be a chronic nuisance property shall not invalidate or otherwise affect the proceedings under this Section.

6. After the notification, but prior to the commencement of legal proceedings by the Village pursuant to this Section, a person in charge stipulates with the Chief of Police that the person in charge will pursue a course of action the parties agree will abate the nuisance activities giving rise to the violation, the chief of police may agree to postpone legal proceedings for a period of not less than ten (10) nor more than thirty (30) days. If the agreed course of action does not result in the abatement of the nuisance activity or if no agreement concerning abatement is reached within thirty (30) days, the Chief of Police shall request authorization from the Village Manager or his/her designee for the Village Attorney to commence a legal proceeding to abate the nuisance.

7. Concurrent with the notification procedures set forth herein, the Chief of Police shall send copies of the notice, as well as, any other documentation which supports legal proceedings to the Village Attorney.

8. When a person in charge makes a response to the Chief of Police as required above, any conduct or statements made in connection with the furnishing of that response shall not constitute an admission that any nuisance activities have or are occurring. This subsection does not require the exclusion of any evidence which is otherwise admissible or offered for any other purpose.

D. Abatement of nuisance. The Village Attorney may commence an action to abate a public nuisance as described in this Section. Upon being satisfied by affidavits or other sworn evidence that an alleged chronic nuisance property exists, the court may without notice or bond enter a temporary restraining order or a preliminary injunction to enjoin any defendant from maintaining such nuisance and may enter an order restraining any defendant from removing or interfering with all property used in connection with the public nuisance.

E. Burden of Proof.

1. In an action seeking closure of a chronic nuisance property pursuant to this Section, the Village shall have the initial burden of showing by a preponderance of the evidence that the property is a chronic nuisance property.

2. It is a defense to an action seeking the closure of chronic nuisance property pursuant to this Section that the owner of the property at the time in question could not in the exercise of reasonable care or diligence, determine that the property had become a chronic nuisance property, or could not, in spite of the exercise of reasonable care and diligence, control the conduct leading to the findings that the property is a chronic nuisance property.

3. In establishing the amount of any civil penalty requested, the court may consider any of the following factors and shall state those found applicable:

- a. The actions or lack of action taken by the person in charge to mitigate or correct the nuisance at the property.
- b. Whether the nuisance at the property was repeated or continuous.
- c. The magnitude or gravity of the nuisance.
- d. the cooperation of the person in charge with the Village.
- e. The cost of the Village investigating and correcting or attempting to correct the nuisance condition..

F. Remedies.

1. In the event a court determines property to be a chronic nuisance property under this Section, the court may order that the property be closed and secured against all use and occupancy for a period of not less than thirty (30) days, but not more than one hundred eighty (180) days or the court may employ any other remedy deemed by it to be appropriate to abate the nuisance.

2. In addition to the remedy provided in subsection (1) above, the court may impose upon the owner of the property a civil penalty in the amount of up to \$500 per day, but no less than \$100 per day, payable to the Village, for each day the owner had actual knowledge that the property was a chronic nuisance property and permitted the property to remain a chronic nuisance property.

3. In determining what remedy or remedies shall be employed, the court may consider evidence of other conduct which has occurred on the property, including, but not limited to:

- a. The disturbance of neighbors.
- b. The recurrence of loud and obnoxious noises.
- G. Emergency closing procedures.

1. In the event that it is determined that the property is an immediate threat to the public health, safety or welfare, the Village may apply to the court for such interim relief, as is deemed appropriate by the Chief of Police. In such an event, the notification provision set forth in Subsection (C) above need not be complied with, however, the Village shall make a diligent effort to notify the person in charge prior to a court hearing.

2. In the event that the court finds the property constitutes a chronic nuisance property as defined in this Section, the court may order the remedy set out above. In addition, in the event that it also finds the person in charge had knowledge of activities or conditions of the property constituting or violating this Section and permitted the activities to occur, the court may assess a civil fine as provided above.

3. The court may authorize the Village to physically secure the property against use or occupancy in the event the owner fails to do so within the time specified by the court. In the event that the Village is authorized to secure the property, all reasonable costs incurred by the Village to affect a closure shall be made and assessed as a lien against the property. If used herein, "costs" means these costs actually incurred by the Village for the physical securing of the property.

4. The Village shall prepare a statement of cost and the Village shall thereafter submit said statement to the court for its review. If no objection of the statement is made within the period described by the court, a lien in said amount may be recorded against said property.

5. Any person who is assessed the cost of closure and/or civil penalty by the court shall be personally liable for the payment thereof to the Village.

H. If any provision, clause or paragraph of this Section shall be held invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity shall not affect the remaining provisions of this Section.

I. Other remedies. The adoption of this Section does not preclude the Village from using any other lawful methods to enforce the provisions of this Code.

BACKGROUND:

The police department is seeking to amend Title 6, Chapter 10, Section 2 of the Orland Park Village Code, SEIZURE AND IMPOUNDMENT OF MOTOR VEHICLES to include that a public nuisance is created by individuals who drive their vehicles at a speed in excess of 26 miles per hour above the applicable maximum speed limit in violation of either 625 ILCS 5/11-601.5 (a) or (b).

The improvements and widening of LaGrange Road from Interstate 80 to 131st Street in the Village of Orland Park were completed about two years ago. Since that time we have seen a significant increase in the number of speeders and an increase in their speed.

In 2018, we wrote 22 citations for speeders exceeding 26 mph over the posted limit and 84 citations for speeders exceeding 35 mph over the speed limit. Almost all of these occurred on LaGrange Road north of 143rd Street.

2.0 INSTALLATION

A. Placement

The floor of the building and the top of the vaults should be the high spot of the site chosen. Finished floor elevation should be 4-6 inches above natural grade measured at the front entrance of the floor. Both the floor and the top of the vault should be above the surrounding ground level with the pathway sloped up to meet the entryway. Ideally, the back of the building should be slightly higher to allow water to freely drain out of the toilet rooms.

B. Excavation, Backfill and Compaction

The hole dug to accommodate the vaults must be large enough to be workable and to allow the floor to the building to fit on the vaults when placed, but small enough to avoid excessive backfill after placement (use your own judgement). Compact the natural ground at the bottom of the vault excavation with a minimum of three passes with a whacker-type mechanical compactor or equivalent approved by the customer. Install aggregate bedding material for building support. Compact aggregate

course with two passes with a whacker-type mechanical tamper or equivalent approved by the customer. Install leveling course of sand so there will be no high spots in the middle of the vault bottom. Set vaults in place. Ideally, the containment area end of the vault should be slightly higher; ¼" per foot of run to allow the building to sit higher. Insure vaults are level; front to back, side to side and vault to vault. Backfill around the structure. Use excavated material for backfill, rocks larger than 6-inches in maximum dimension shall not be placed within 6-inches of the exterior vault walls. Fill, adjacent to the building entry will have excavated material placed in 8-inch loose lifts and compacted with a minimum of two passes with a whacker-type mechanical compactor or equivalent approved by customer. After the vaults are placed in the hole and backfilled, place the butyl tape supplied around the entire top surface of the vaults. Make sure that the area is free of debris.

C. Other Important Points

- 1. Southern exposure for the vent stack is ideal, as this allows for heating of the vent stack. Heating of the vent stack aids in the venting of the building. Whenever possible, the placement of the building should be chosen with this in mind.
- 2. Aggregate bedding material provides a solid base for the vault.
- 3. Sand is preferable for use in leveling the bottom of the hole excavated for the vault, as it is easier to level.
- 4. Use of softeners when lifting the building is critical to prevent spawling to the roof of the building, if nylon leads are not available.
- 5. When lining up the vault and the floor of the building, lining up the rear corners of the vault (the containment portion) and floor (by the clean-out and vent stack) is the easiest and best way to set the building. The screen section and sidewalks will overhang the vault by several inches.
- 6. Important: Check the seal of the containment portion of the vault by getting into the vault through the clean-out cover in the back of the building after building placement. There should be no light leaking through, with the exception of the riser and vent stack holes.
- 7. Use the caulk provided to seal around the riser and vent stack where it joins the floor and roof panels. When sealing the vent stack, be sure to put a bead of caulk in the floor vent hole, insert vent stack, then caulk around vent stack.

D. Recommended Lifting Equipment

Staff will be installing the shelter in-house. Additional costs will be incurred with site preparation for installation of the concrete pad and pavilion itself.

On February 4, 2019, this item was reviewed by the Parks & Recreation Committee, recommended for approval, and referred to the Village Board of Trustees for consideration.

WHEREAS, an application seeking an amended special use permit amending the special use permit authorized by Ordinance No. 1651, passed March 2, 1987, for a Planned Development with a modification and associated Certificate of Appropriateness, has been filed by the Petitioner (the "Village") with the Village Clerk of this Village and has been referred to the Plan Commission of this Village and has been processed in accordance with the Land Development Code of the Village of Orland Park as amended; and

WHEREAS, said Plan Commission of this Village held a public hearing on January 10, 2019, on whether the requested amended special use permit for a Planned Development with a modification and approval of a Certificate of Appropriateness should be granted, at which time all persons present were afforded an opportunity to be heard; and

WHEREAS, a public notice in the form required by law was given of said public hearing by publication not more than 30 days nor less than 15 days prior to said hearing in the Orland Park Prairie, a newspaper of general circulation in this Village; and

WHEREAS, the Plan Commission of this Village has filed its report of findings and recommendations that the requested amended special use with modification be granted with this President and Board of Trustees, and this Board of Trustees have duly considered said report and findings and recommendations;

NOW THEREFORE, Be It Ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Orland Park, Cook and Will Counties, Illinois, as follows:

SECTION 1

The Plan Commission of this Village has made its report of findings and recommendations regarding the proposed amended special use permit for a Planned Development with modification. The findings of the Plan Commission are herein incorporated by reference as the findings of this President and Board of Trustees, as completely as if fully recited herein at length. All exhibits submitted at the aforesaid public hearings are also hereby incorporated by reference as fully as if attached hereto. This President and Board of Trustees further finds that the proposed amended special use permit a with modification and Certificate of Appropriateness is in the public good and in the best interests of the Village and its residents and is consistent with and fosters the purposes and spirit of the Orland Park Land Development Code as set forth in Section 1-102 thereof. Said amended special use for a Planned Development is also in accordance with the provisions of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan of the Village, which designates the site at 14700 S. Ravinia Avenue ("Subject Property") as "Community and Institutional".

SECTION 2

In addition to the findings set forth in Section 1 hereof, this Board of Trustees further finds, in relation to the proposed amended special use for a Planned Development to allow for updates to the Village Center parking lots, an updated Village Hall entry plaza, improvements to the campus-wide Pedestrian circulation, the installation of two (2) "green" roofs at the Village Hall and creation of a Village Center master landscape plan in the VC Village Center Zoning District with a modification and Certificate of Appropriateness as follows:

(a) The Subject Property is located at 14700 S. Ravinia Avenue within the Village and the proposal is to develop the Village Center Campus (which includes the Frederick T. Owens Village Hall, William R. Vogel Civic Center, the Franklin E. Loebe Recreation Center and the Ara Pace Veteran's Memorial) as a Planned Development to cause improvements to the Village Center parking lots, improve pedestrian circulation, the installation of two (2) "green" roofs at the Village Hall and implement a master landscape plan.

(b) The proposed development is consistent with the purposes, goals, objectives and standards of the Comprehensive Plan, any adopted overlay plan and the Land Development Code. The Comprehensive Plan designates this area as "Community and Institutional", and the Subject Property is located in the VC Village Center Zoning District. The Subject Property will fulfill the VC Village Center District's established principles by creating a mixed use walkable neighborhood in the heart of the Village and to ensure that the District will create a unique pedestrian scale and civic character.

(c) The proposed development will be consistent with the character of the immediate vicinity of the Subject Property, i.e., to the north is the Village Recreation Administration building; to the south is undeveloped forest and marsh land;; to the east is vacant and to the west is the Franklin Loebe Recreation center.

(d) The design of the development will minimize adverse effects. The proposed site plan demonstrates the safety and access benefits of improvements to existing parking including new lighting as well as improved pedestrian circulation and environmental benefits resulting from the "green" roof system.

(e) There will be no adverse effects on the value of adjacent property. The Subject Property is currently improved with Village governmental buildings and related parking, and this amended special use planned development will facilitate new landscaping on and around the Subject Property, and will have entry plaza and improve parking and update the Village pedestrian access and circulation.

(f) The Petitioner has demonstrated that public facilities and services, including but not limited to roadways, park facilities, police and fire protection, hospital and medical services, drainage systems, refuse disposal, water and sewers will be capable of serving the amended special use at an adequate level of service. All utilities are accounted for and can accommodate the proposed development layout. Specifically, adequate capacity for sanitary and water service is available on

site, the storm water management system campus has adequate capacity to service the development improvements.

(g) Petitioner has made adequate legal provision to guarantee the provision and development of any open space and other improvements associated with the proposed development.

(h) The development will not adversely affect a known archaeological, historical or cultural resource.

The amended special use planned development amending the special use permit authorized by Ordinance No. 1651 passed March 2, 1987 with a modification hereinafter described, and a Certificate of Appropriateness for the Orland Park Village Center Site Improvements is approved and shall be developed substantially in accordance and as shown on the plan entitled "Proposed Improvements – Village Hall North Parking Lot Concept Plan" prepared by Strand Associates dated January 15, 2019, Sheets 1 through 5, the conceptual landscape plan titled "Village Center Conceptual Landscape Plan" dated December 1, 2018 said the preliminary plan titled "Village Hall Plaza Renovation" drawn by Studio GC dated December 26, 2018, subject to the following conditions.

1) All Building Code and Engineering related requirements are met;

2) Petitioner must provide additional landscaping throughout the Village Center Campus to offset the reduced parking lot screening requirements; and

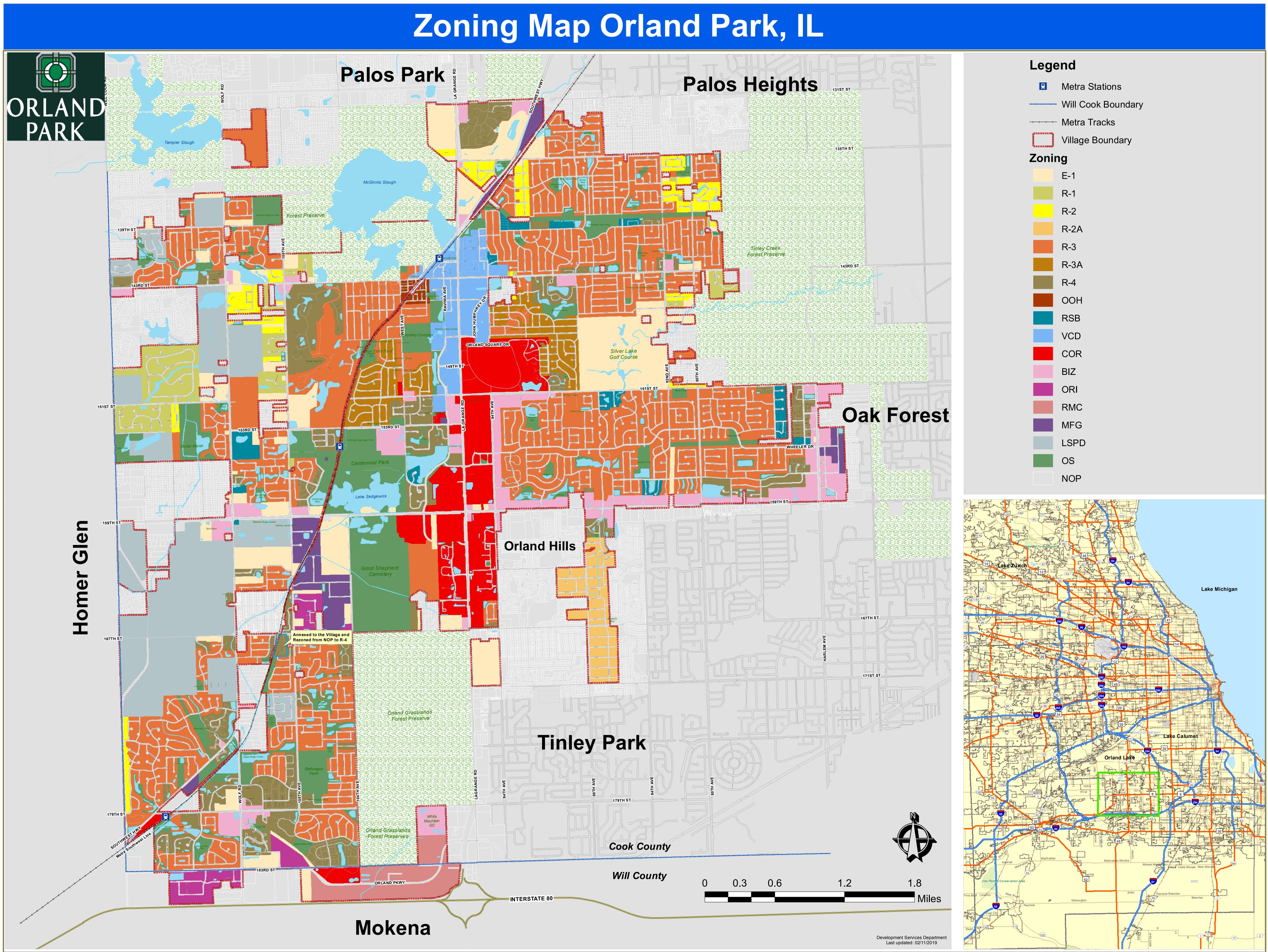

BACKGROUND:

This request is for the Village Board of Trustees to consider a resolution in support of the renewal of the Class 6b status for property located at 16242 107th Avenue (PIN 27-20-207-003-0000) in Orland Park. The subject property was granted a Class 6b in 2005. The owner of the property, Robert Skrocki applied for the original Class 6 designation and is requesting this resolution of support for the renewal.

The subject property is the home to Ambassador Car Carriers a towing and warehousing business located on lot 39 in Beemsterboer Industrial Park Phase 5. The original incentive allowed Mr. Skrocki to relocate from 9513 West 143rd Street and construct the current location at 16242 107th Ave. According to the information submitted by the petitioner, this business has four (4) full-time employees. Mr. Skrocki stated in the previous request stated that but for the assistance of Cook County's 6b Classification reducing the property tax rate, he would not be able to build his facility in Orland Park, Cook County.

The industrial use of this property provides a necessary service to the Village of Orland Park and has been providing a benefit to the community for over 30 years. The original 6b designation allowed the business to construct a new industrial facility in Orland Park and the renewal will ensure the business can remain in Orland Park.

The Class 6b incentive, offered through Cook County, provides for a substantial reduction in assessed valuation resulting in significant tax savings. The incentive term is for a period of 10 years (10% of market value) and then begins to rise in years 11 & 12 (15% and 20% respectively). In the absence of this incentive, real estate would normally be assessed at 25% of its market value.

As of September of 2018 Cook County has made amendments to the ordinances that govern incentives. Most notably, the incentive holder must now provide certified payroll to the Village of Orland Park for any work that is completed at the subject property. This includes maintenance, repair and new construction. The incentive holder is required to pay a prevailing wage to their contractors. The Village does not have to verify the payroll documents; however they must be kept on file. The petitioner must meet all Cook County requirements to maintain their incentive designation.

BACKGROUND:

In December 2018 the Board approved a budget amendment for FY2019 to include the PACE Municipal Vehicle Program (MVP) as a more cost-effective alternative to the former PACE Bus Dial A Ride transportation program.

The new program will utilize a 7 passenger van with lift, provided and maintained by PACE at a cost of \$100.00 per month. This program will service only persons with disabilities that preregister with the village. The program is intended for operation 4 days a week on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, with first pick-up after 8:00 AM and last drop-off by 3:00 PM. Service will not extend beyond the corporate limits of Orland Park.

In order to proceed with the program, the village must enter into an agreement with PACE. This agreement differs from the village's previous agreement in several ways. PACE will furnish the van and provide the village with a maintenance card that will allow village staff to bring the vehicle to a local shop for regular maintenance and repairs. As with the previous agreement driver certification/training is also a requirement along with various other personnel related guidelines. Staff continues to work with PACE to ensure all requirements are appropriately addressed.

PACE has provided a draft resolution authorizing the Village of Orland Park, Illinois, to execute an agreement for the Municipal Vehicle Program with the Suburban Bus Division of the Regional Transportation Authority (PACE).

The Village Attorney has reviewed the agreement.

This agenda item is being considered by the Public Works Committee and the Village Board of Trustees on the same night.

BUDGET IMPACT:

Funds for this program are included in the FY2019 Transportation Budget (5003).

REQUESTED ACTION:

I move to pass Resolution Number ______, entitled: RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF THE PACE BUS MUNICIPAL VEHICLE PROGRAM AGREEMENT.

PACE MUNICIPAL VEHICLE PROGRAM AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT made this _____ day of ______, 2019 by and between Pace, the Suburban Bus Division of the RTA (hereinafter referred to as "Pace"), and VILLAGE OF ORLAND PARK (hereinafter referred to as "Municipality") whose address is 14700 S. Ravinia Ave., Orland Park, IL 60462. For the purposes of this contract, "Municipality" is defined as any City, Village, Township, County, Park District, unit of local government, public Community College or University, or a Municipality comprised of any of the above within the six-county jurisdiction of the Regional Transportation Authority.

WHEREAS, Pace is devoted to the provision of public transportation as an essential public purpose, important to the goals of improved access and mobility for the people of Northeastern Illinois, reduced traffic congestion and environmental hazards, and support for the Region's economy; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality has requested the use of public transportation vehicle(s) for regular and continuing general or special transportation to the public for certain public transportation purposes (described in Exhibit B attached hereto);

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

1. Basic Rate/Funding

Pace shall furnish vehicle(s) to Municipality for its Service. At the end of each month of service, Pace shall send the Municipality an invoice for the following month's Service, payable within 30 days of receipt. At that time, Municipality shall pay Pace One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) per month per vehicle. Pace has the right to change monthly fares when deemed appropriate by the Pace Board of Directors. Pace will provide the Municipality with thirty (30) day written notice prior to any change in monthly fares. Should the Municipality's monthly fare payment become two or more months in arrears, a late fee of \$25.00 per month per vehicle will be charged until the account is brought to current.

2. Receipt of Vehicle(s) / Service to Disabled

Acceptance of a non-lift equipped vehicle is contingent upon Municipality continuing its preexisting service for individuals with disabilities, with vehicles other than the vehicle contracted for herein, for the duration of this contract. Should Municipality discontinue it's existing service to individuals with disabilities at any time during the pendency of this contract, Municipality shall immediately notify Pace, who may, in it's sole discretion either replace the vehicle(s) contracted for herein with one(s) that will enable the Municipality to continue service for individuals with disabilities, if equipment is available, or terminate this contract.

Municipality must comply in all respects to the federal requirement for comparable paratransit service. A demand responsive system shall be deemed to provide equivalent service if the service available to individuals with disabilities, including individuals who use mobility aids, is provided in the most integrated setting appropriate to the needs of the individual and is equivalent to the service provided other individuals with respect to the following service characteristics:

- 1. Response time;
- 2. Fares;
- 3. Geographic area of service;
- 4. Hours and days of service;
- 5. Availability of information;
- 6. Reservations capability;
- 7. Any constraints on capacity or service availability;
- 8. Restrictions priorities based on trip purpose.

Municipality shall certify to Pace on The Monthly Municipal Vehicle Program Report that it is providing equivalent service to individuals with disabilities, including individuals who use mobility aids, in its demand responsive transportation services.

3. Pass Through Funding Provisions

Pace applied and received federal funds to purchase the equipment being used by municipality in this project. As a condition to receipt of these federal funds Pace agrees to comply with all applicable Federal laws, regulations, and directives contained in the current FTA Master Agreement MA (13) for Federal Fiscal Year 2018 which can be found at the FTA website <u>http://ww.fta.dot.gov/documents/13-Master.doc</u>. Said Master Agreement is incorporated by reference into this Agreement as though fully set forth herein. As a condition to Municipality's use of federally funded equipment in the project, Municipality agrees to comply with all applicable Federal laws, regulations, and directives contained in the current FTA Master Agreement MA (13) for Federal Fiscal Year 2018.

The Certifications and Assurances attached hereto and made a part hereof as Exhibit A, is a streamlined compilation from the Master Agreement of provisions covered by statutory or regulatory certification or assurance requirements. Not every provision of these certifications and assurances will apply to Municipality or this project. Page 1 of Exhibit A indicates applicable provisions for this project. To ensure compliance with the applicable terms of the Master Agreement, Municipality agrees to execute and submit to Pace page 2 of Exhibit A, **FEDERAL FISCAL YEAR 2018 FTA CERTIFICATIONS AND ASSURANCES SIGNATURE PAGE.** Thereafter on an annual basis Municipality shall execute Certifications and Assurances to ensure that it continues to comply with all applicable provisions of the Master Agreement for the life of the project and the term of this Agreement.

Municipality understands and agrees that Federal laws, regulations, and directives applicable to this project and to Pace and the Municipality on the date on which the FTA authorized assistance for the project may be modified from time to time. In particular, new Federal laws, regulations, and directives may become effective after the date on which Pace executed the Grant Agreement for the project and the changed requirements will apply to the project, except to the extent that the FTA determines otherwise in writing.

4. <u>Security Deposit</u>

Municipality shall pay to Pace a security deposit in the amount of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) per vehicle prior to receipt of each vehicle. The deposit amount (without interest) shall be returned to Municipality upon return of the vehicle to Pace, provided the vehicle is returned in the same condition as when it was delivered to Municipality, ordinary wear and tear excepted. Any amounts due to Pace from Municipality may be deducted from the deposit amount.

5. Vehicle Usage Requirement

Pace will review monthly the vehicle utilization in terms of the program goals and stated contractual intended use. Pace reserves the right to terminate this Agreement or substitute a more appropriate vehicle based on the vehicle utilization, in the event that the vehicle is not being used in a manner consistent with the program goals and stated contractual intended use.

6. Conditions and Restrictions on Use

Municipality shall not allow the vehicle(s) to be used in the following manner:

- (a) For courier service, ambulance-type service, or the transportation of goods, to pull trailers, or allow the consumption of alcoholic beverages on the vehicle.
- (b) For personal use of any driver or other person.
- (c) Use or allow the vehicle to be used illegally or improperly for hire.
- (d) Remove the vehicle from the State of Illinois, unless written approval is obtained in advance from Pace (See Exhibit C).
- (e) Alter, mark or install equipment in or on the vehicle, unless written approval is obtained in advance from Pace (See Exhibit C).
- (f) Expose the vehicle to seizure, confiscation, forfeiture or other involuntary transfer.
- (g) For charter service.
- (h) For school bus service.
- (i) For non-transit use.
- (i) To transport groups of children under the age of eight (8).

Municipality shall ensure that the vehicle is locked at all times while parked and that the vehicle is parked while not in use, and overnight, in a secure, off-street location (preferably on Municipality's property or at public transportation centers). Municipality shall take appropriate steps towards the security of Pace's vehicle(s). Municipality shall notify Pace where the vehicles will be located/stored overnight. Municipality is responsible for all dispatch operations for the service.

7. Drug and Alcohol Policy and Training Program

Municipality shall have an adopted Drug and Alcohol Policy and Training Program in effect during the terms of this Agreement. The Drug and Alcohol Policy and Training Program must meet Federal Transit Administration (FTA) and Pace mandates pertaining to deterrence, provisions for drug and alcohol testing and methodology. A current copy of Municipality's Drug and Alcohol Policy and Training Program must be provided to Pace.

8. Safety, Security and Emergency Preparedness Plan

Municipality shall have an adopted Safety, Security and Emergency Preparedness Plan in effect during the terms of this Agreement. The Safety, Security and Emergency Preparedness Plan must meet Federal Transit Administration (FTA) and Pace mandates. A current copy of the Municipality's Safety, Security and Emergency Preparedness Plan must be provided to Pace.

9. <u>Drivers</u>

Municipality is responsible for providing its own drivers. Each Municipal Vehicle Program driver must be approved by Pace prior to operating a Pace vehicle. Drivers are not considered employees or agents of Pace or the RTA. Municipality may select its own employees to serve as drivers, including but not limited to bonded municipal drivers or municipal employees. Municipal Vehicle Program drivers must be selected on the basis of their qualifications, in accordance with Federal, State, and Local laws and regulations, and within the provisions of the established Pace Municipal Vehicle Program Driver Standards and Municipal Vehicle Program Operations Manual.

Municipality shall ensure that Pace vehicle(s) are operated only by Pace approved drivers that meet the established Pace Municipal Vehicle Program Driver Standards, including all federal, state and local standards. Municipality shall comply with driver and safety standards set forth in the Pace Municipal Vehicle Program Operations Manual. In addition, Municipality shall maintain a file on said drivers evidencing valid drivers license, valid U.S. DOT physical examination, drug and alcohol test results, a criminal background check, driver training, and Motor Vehicle Reports for the previous five (5) years and/or their entire driving history as necessary.

Municipality shall use its own established driver training program, and, shall provide documentation for said programs as to any of its drivers under this Agreement. Pace reserves the right to establish additional guidelines in regards to driver procedures and standards. Guidelines established in any bulletins or manuals are to be considered as part of this Agreement.

10. Transportation Coordinator

Municipality must designate an individual to serve as Pace's primary contact person on all matters relating to operation of the Pace vehicle(s) and to coordinate the Municipal Vehicle Program for the Municipality. This individual is required to attend and complete administrative training provided by Pace. Municipality will notify Pace immediately if this individual is replaced.

11. Employees

<u>Compliance with Federal, State and Local Laws</u>. Municipality agrees that with respect to persons employed by it to provide the Transportation Services and Other Services, it will comply with all applicable federal, state, and local labor laws including, but not limited to,

any and all laws relating to the minimum wages to be paid to its employees, limitations upon the employment of minors, minimum fair wage standards for minors, the payment of wages due employees, and all applicable regulations established to protect the health and safety of employees, passengers, and the public-at-large. Municipality also agrees to provide the employee protection, if required, under Section 13(c) of the Urban Mass Transportation Act of 1964, as amended, 49 U.S.C. ' 1609(c), and Section 2.16 of the Regional Transportation Authority Act, (70 ILCS 3615/2.16), for persons employed by it to provide the Transportation Services.

Employees. Municipality shall employ only such persons as are competent and qualified to provide the Transportation Services in accordance with the requirements of this Agreement and Pace policies, practices, procedures and standards. All employees shall meet all applicable qualifications established by federal, state and local laws and regulations. Drivers shall display proper courtesy toward passengers and maintain a neat and clean appearance. Municipality shall comply with all Federal and Pace requirements relating to drug and alcohol testing. Municipality shall participate in driver training programs, if any, established by Pace during the Agreement Term and shall comply with all Pace, Federal, and State driver and safety standards. Failure by Municipality or any Third Party Provider of Municipality to comply with said requirements shall constitute grounds for termination of this Agreement.

Employment Contracts and Labor Agreements. Municipality shall notify Pace of any labor negotiations being conducted with its employees and shall keep Pace fully informed of any pending labor issues which may affect service.

12. Records and Reports

Municipality must designate an individual to serve as Pace's contact person on all matters relating to operation of the Pace vehicle. This individual must attend an orientation session with Pace staff regarding monthly reporting procedures prior to Municipality's receipt of vehicle. Municipality shall keep accurate and timely records on such forms as are provided by Pace. Municipality shall collect and forward these reports to Pace on such schedule as directed by Pace. These reports include, but are not limited to monthly reports and monthly ridership log for each vehicle, and driver information forms. Failure to comply with the reporting required herein shall be considered a breach of this Agreement and cause for immediate termination. A \$7.00 late fee may be charged for late or missed reports that are postmarked after the 5th of the month.

Municipality agrees to report the actual miles traveled in each vehicle per month on such forms as are provided by Pace. Municipality agrees to report revenues and expenses of operation on a monthly basis. In addition, Municipality agrees to complete the Ridership Log on a monthly basis.

Pace reserves the right to change the reporting requirements as necessary upon 30 days written notice to Municipality. Any reporting forms provided by Pace to the Municipality are to be considered as included with this Agreement.

13. Accident Reporting

Municipality agrees to comply with any accident reporting procedures as set forth by Pace.

Serious accident/incidents which involve injuries requiring transport from the scene or requiring any vehicle to be towed from the scene or any other event of a serious nature, must be immediately reported to Pace. Any damage to Pace vehicle as the result of an accident will be the responsibility of the Municipality, and any necessary repairs must be effected in a timely basis. Pace reserves the right to revise accident reporting procedures as necessary upon 30 days written notice to Municipality. Any accident reporting procedures or forms provided by Pace to the Municipality shall be considered to be part of this Agreement.

14. Maintenance and Repairs

Municipality acknowledges that a Pace designated vendor will provide fleet management services for Pace fleet vehicles utilized in the Municipal Vehicle Program. Municipality agrees to cooperate with the Pace designated vendor at all times and to abide by any rules promulgated by Pace and the Pace designated vendor with respect to fleet management services utilized in the Municipal Vehicle Program. Pace reserves the right to revise maintenance requirements and procedures as necessary.

Pace shall pay the costs of ordinary maintenance and repairs, provided Municipality adheres to Pace's inspection and maintenance schedule. Municipality shall be liable for all repair and maintenance costs resulting from its failure to adhere to the inspection and preventive maintenance schedule, or attributable to abuse of the vehicle or negligence in its maintenance.

Municipality shall ensure that drivers perform all maintenance, cleanings and servicing of the vehicles as per the schedule set forth in Pace's Municipal Vehicle Program Operations Manual and vehicle's owner manual; have the vehicle safety inspected semi-annually as required by law; obtain prior approval from the Pace Office or its designated agent for any expenditure in excess of \$50.00 per vehicle.

Municipality shall be responsible for the cost of all washing, detailing and storage of the vehicle as per the schedule set forth in Pace's Municipal Vehicle Program Operations Manual and to the extent necessary to maintain the vehicle in good and clean condition.

15. Pace Equipment Provided; Inventory and Documentation

Pace reserves the right to substitute a different vehicle at any time. Municipality agrees to comply with all Pace procedures for handling Pace Equipment. Municipality agrees to cooperate fully with Pace in developing and maintaining an accurate inventory of all Pace Equipment from time to time in the possession of Municipality. Municipality shall complete and process all documentation necessary to evidence and record the receipt, possession, return or transfer of any Pace Equipment coming into, being in or leaving its possession.

16. Equipment Inspection

Pace or its designee shall have the right from time to time to cause the equipment and maintenance records to be inspected during normal business hours by any person appointed by Pace. Municipality must comply with Illinois Department of Transportation safety inspection every six months. Upon receipt of documentation evidencing compliance with

Illinois Department of Transportation safety inspection, Municipality shall furnish same to Pace within a reasonable time, not to exceed ten (10) days.

Should the above inspection find that the equipment has not been maintained in accordance with the terms and conditions of Section 13 of this Agreement, the inspector shall report all deficiencies noted to the Municipality. Municipality shall have thirty (30) days to correct the deficiencies noted. If not corrected, it shall constitute a breach of this Agreement and cause for immediate termination and repossession of any and all vehicles.

17. Return of Vehicle

Upon termination of the Agreement, Municipality shall return the vehicle to Pace in the same condition as when it was delivered, ordinary wear and tear excepted. Upon its delivery and return, Municipality and Pace shall inspect the vehicle and provide a report on its condition. The report shall be signed by both Pace and Municipality.

Any damage to the vehicle which is determined by Pace to be caused by Municipality's neglect of the vehicle will be the sole responsibility of Municipality, and Municipality shall compensate Pace for the cost of such repairs.

18. Hold Harmless, Indemnification and Insurance

Municipality, its officers, employees, agents and contractors agree:

(a) To waive, release and hold harmless Pace, its directors, officers, employees and agents, or any other transportation agency, from and against any claims, injuries, losses, or any causes of action whatsoever, arising out of or in any way relating to the use of Pace Vehicles by any and all third party providers as defined in paragraph 24 of this agreement, and as provided in the Agreement by Municipality, its officers, employees, agents, contractors.

(b) To indemnify Pace, its directors, officers, employees and agents, and any other transportation agency, from and against any claims, liabilities, losses, suits, judgments or settlements of any party arising out of or in any way relating to the use of Pace Vehicles by any and all third party providers as defined in paragraph 24 of this agreement, and by Municipality, its officers, employees, agents, contractors.

(c) To indemnify Pace, its directors, officers, employees and agents against any and all financial loss resulting from a violation of Pace requirements or misuse of Pace property. In the event of any resulting financial loss to Pace, Municipality agrees to be responsible for the full amount of the loss including but not limited to:

- The cost of reasonable and necessary repairs to the Pace vehicle, or the Actual Cash Value of the Pace vehicle whichever is less.
- Loss of use of the Pace vehicle.
- Loss of revenue.
- All unauthorized charges on the Pace provided credit card(s) assigned and issued to the Municipality.

Municipality and any of its officers, directors, employees, agents, contractors or third party providers utilizing the Pace Vehicles agree to comply with the Municipal Participant Insurance Requirements in Exhibit D and shall each carry and keep in force commercial general and auto liability insurance covering the use of the Pace Vehicles in amounts not less than the following:

- (a) Commercial General Liability (including Broad Form Contractual):
 - (1) Bodily Injury Liability
 - (2) Property Damage Liability
 - Combined Liability Limits of \$5,000,000.00
- (b) Auto Liability:
 - (1) Bodily Injury Liability
 - (2) Property Damage Liability

Combined Liability Limits of \$5,000,000.00

- (c) Auto Physical Damage:
 - (1) Collision and Comprehensive
- (d) Worker's Compensation: Minimum statutory coverage.

If Municipality's current certificate of insurance does not meet the requirements stated above, Municipality must update their insurance to meet these requirements and resubmit the certificate of insurance to Pace for approval. Upon thirty (30) day written notice to the Municipality, Pace reserves the right to change minimum insurance requirements.

Insurance carried by Municipality and its contractors shall be primary over any other insurance carried by Pace, including self-insurance. The Suburban Bus Division of the Regional Transportation Authority, d/b/a Pace, and the Regional Transportation Authority shall be named as additional insureds on above policies. Insurance is to be provided by an insurance company which meets or exceeds Best's rating of A-VII. Before delivery of the equipment, Municipality shall present certificates of insurance satisfactory to Pace, showing Pace and RTA (as described herein) as additional insureds, including certificates from any of its contractors utilizing the Pace Vehicles. Municipality shall provide Pace with any new certificate of insurance upon renewal or if any information has changed.

19. Equal Employment And Business Opportunity, Non-Discrimination

<u>Compliance With Federal, State and Local Laws</u>. Municipality shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local anti-discrimination and equal employment and business opportunity laws and regulations, including, but not limited to, the Age Discrimination in Employment Act, as amended, 29 U.S.C. " 621 <u>et seq</u>., Title VII of the Civil Rights Acts of 1964, as amended, 42 U.S.C. " 2000e <u>et seq</u>., the Civil Rights Acts of 1866 and 1871, 42 U.S.C. " 1981 and 1983; and the Illinois Human Rights Act, 775 ILCS 5/1-101 <u>et seq</u>.

Equal Employment Opportunity. Municipality shall comply with all of the affirmative action, equal employment opportunity and disadvantaged business enterprise requirements in Exhibit A.

Failure to Comply. In the event Municipality's noncompliance with any provision set forth in Exhibit A or with any federal, state, or local anti-discrimination or equal employment or

business opportunity law, including but not limited to those identified in Section 18 hereof, results in Municipality being declared non-responsible and, therefore, ineligible for future contracts or subcontracts with the State of Illinois or any of its political subdivisions or municipal corporations, this Agreement may be canceled or voided by Pace in whole or in part, and such other sanctions, penalties or remedies as may be provided by law or regulation may be imposed or invoked.

Municipality shall comply with all applicable provisions of Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act and the Americans with Disabilities Act.

20. Non-Discrimination

Municipality understands and agrees that regardless of the primary purpose of the usage of the vehicle, that service provided must be open to the public (within the limits of schedule and space availability) and shall not be restricted to a particular group of individuals. The parties shall cooperate to ensure that no person shall be denied the opportunity to participate in nor be subjected to discrimination in the conduct of the service because of race, creed, color, age, sex, national origin, nor the presence of any sensory, mental or physical disability, nor in any manner contrary to applicable local ordinance, state and federal laws and regulations, specifically including Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964; Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 21 - Nondiscrimination in Federally Assisted Programs of the Department of Transportation. Municipality agrees to comply with all provisions of Affirmative Action, Equal Employment Opportunity and Disadvantaged Business Enterprises set forth in Exhibit A attached hereto.

21. Audit and Record Keeping

Municipality shall permit authorized representatives of Pace, the Federal Transit Administration (FTA), or its designees to inspect and audit all records and data associated with the operation of the Service. Municipality shall retain all records associated with the service for a period of five (5) years following expiration or termination of the service or such longer period of time for any pending audit, litigation or other claim.

22. Financial Integrity

As a condition of participation in the Municipal Service, Municipality will be required to provide a financial audit for the most recent year and any other financial information requested by Pace to assist Pace in verifying Municipality's financial capability to undertake its obligation under this Agreement. At any time during the term of its participation in the Municipal Service, Municipality agrees to furnish Pace within forty-eight hours of receipt of Pace's written request (which request may be forwarded by mail, telefax, or e-mail transmission), evidence satisfactory to Pace of Municipality's ability and capacity, financial or otherwise, to carry out its obligation under this Agreement and the Municipal Service.

23. Entire Agreement

This Agreement contains the full understanding between Pace and the Municipality. All prior Agreements, oral or written, are hereby expressly canceled.

24. Amendments

Pace reserves the right to make amendments by modifying and/or adding to any of the terms of this Agreement by providing the Municipality with thirty (30) days written notice.

25. Third Party Providers Requirements

"Third Party Providers" as used in this Agreement are any other parties who, pursuant to contract or agreement with Municipality, directly provide a significant part of the Transportation Services. All service provided by a Third Party Provider to a Municipality shall be competitively solicited at least once every five years and as frequently as once a year if required by Pace. Contracts with Third Party Providers shall be made in accordance with applicable laws. All such agreements shall be in writing with a copy provided to Pace. Submission of the third party agreement to Pace does not release the Municipality from any obligation under this Agreement, nor operate as a waiver of any rights of Pace under this Agreement. The Municipality shall cause each of its Third Party Providers to comply with all applicable provisions of this Agreement and the Pace Vehicle Program Operations Manual as if the name of the Third Party Provider has been substituted for the name of the Municipality therein. In the event that Pace Equipment is to be used by a Third Party Provider, such Third Party Provider shall execute a written sublease in a form approved by Pace prior to the use of Pace Equipment.

26. <u>Terms</u>

This Agreement shall be effective as of the day of its signing and shall continue in force until one of the parties gives the other party written notice thirty (30) days in advance of the desired termination date. Either party may terminate this Agreement, with the required written notice thirty (30) days in advance of the desired termination date, without cause or reason. Pace may terminate the Agreement upon five (5) days notice in the event of failure by the Municipality to correct any safety or accident reporting violations or for failure of Municipality to pay Pace amounts due on a timely basis. If upon termination or directed to return the vehicle to Pace, Municipality fails to return the vehicle to Pace, Municipality will permit Pace, without demand, legal process, or a breach of the peace, to enter any premises under the contract of Municipality where the vehicles are located and to take possession of and remove the equipment. Municipality shall not prosecute or assist in the prosecution of any claim, suit, action, or other proceeding arising out of any such repossession by Pace. This Agreement may not be assigned by Municipality without the approval of Pace. All successors and assigned will be bound by the terms and conditions of this Agreement and must fully comply therewith. IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Parties hereto have caused this Agreement to be executed as of the MUNICIPALITY date indicated above by their duly-authorized representatives.

- (j) It will incorporate these assurances by reference into and make them a part of any third party contract or subagreement, or any amendments thereto, related to its Award that involves relocation or land acquisition.
- (k) It will provide in any affected document that these relocation and land acquisition provisions must supersede any conflicting provisions.

 - (l) Complying with the institution of environmental quality control measures under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, as amended, 42 U.S.C. §§ 4321 – 4335 and following Executive Order No. 11514, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 4321 note.
 - (2) Following the notification of violating facilities provisions of Executive Order No. 11738, 42 U.S.C. § 7606 note.
 - (3) Following the protection of wetlands provisions of Executive Order No. 11990,
 42 U.S.C. § 4321 note.

- (4) Following the evaluation of flood hazards in the floodplains provisions of Executive Order No. 11988, May 24, 1977, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 4321 note.
- (5) Complying with the assurance of consistency with the approved state management program developed pursuant to the Coastal Zone Management Act of 1972, as amended, 16 U.S.C. §§ 1451 1465.
- (6) Complying with the Conformity of Federal Actions to State (Clean Air)
 Implementation Plans requirements under section 176(c) of the Clean Air Act of 1970, as amended, 42 U.S.C. §§ 7401 7671q.
- (7) Complying with protections for underground sources of drinking water under the Safe Drinking Water Act of 1974, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 300f 300j-6.
- (8) Complying with the protections for endangered species under the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended, 16 U.S.C. §§ 1531 1544.
- (9) Complying with the environmental protections for federal transportation programs, including, but not limited to, protections for parks, recreation areas, or wildlife or waterfowl refuges of national, state, or local significance or any land from a historic site of national, state, or local significance to be used in a transportation Award, as required by 49 U.S.C. § 303 (also known as "Section 4f").
- (10) Complying with the protections for national wild and scenic rivers systems, as required under the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act of 1968, as amended, 16 U.S.C. §§ 1271 – 1287.
- (11) Complying with and facilitating compliance with:
 - (a) Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended, 54 U.S.C. § 300108,
 - (b) The Archaeological and Historic Preservation Act of 1974, as amended, 54 U.S.C. § 312501 *et seq.*, and

- g. To the extent applicable, it will comply with the following federal requirements for the care, handling, and treatment of warm-blooded animals held or used for research, teaching, or other activities supported with federal assistance:
 - (1) The Animal Welfare Act, as amended, 7 U.S.C. § 2131 et seq., and
 - U.S. Department of Agriculture regulations, "Animal Welfare," 9 CFR subchapter A, parts 1, 2, 3, and 4.
- h. To the extent applicable, it will obtain a certificate of compliance with the seismic design and construction requirements of U.S. DOT regulations, "Seismic Safety," 49 CFR part 41, specifically 49 CFR § 41.117(d), before accepting delivery of any FTA assisted buildings.
- i. It will comply with and assure that each of its Subrecipients located in special flood hazard areas will comply with section 102(a) of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 4012a(a), by:
 - (1) Participating in the federal flood insurance program, and
 - Purchasing flood insurance if the total cost of insurable construction and acquisition is \$10,000 or more.
- j. It will comply with:

- k. It will perform the financial and compliance audits as required by the:

 - (2) U.S. DOT regulations, "Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards," 2 CFR part 1201, which incorporates by reference U.S. OMB regulatory guidance, "Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards," 2 CFR part 200, and
 - (3) Most recent applicable U.S. OMB Compliance Supplement, 2 CFR part 200, appendix XI (previously known as the U.S. OMB Circular A-133 Compliance Supplement).
- 1. It will comply with all other federal laws, regulations, and requirements that apply.
- m. It will follow federal guidance governing it and its Award, except as FTA has expressly approved otherwise in writing.

- c. A Third Party Participant includes any:
 - (1) Subrecipient at any tier,
 - (2) Lessee,
 - (3) Third Party Contractor or Subcontractor at any tier, and (4) Other Third Party Participant in its Award.
- d. You and your Applicant agree that neither it nor any governmental authority or publicly owned operator that receives federal public transportation assistance appropriated or made available for its Award will engage in charter service operations, except as permitted under:
 - (1) Federal transit laws, specifically 49 U.S.C. § 5323(d) and (g),
 - (2) FTA regulations, "Charter Service," 49 CFR part 604, to the extent consistent with 49 U.S.C. § 5323(d) and (g),
 - (3) Any other federal Charter Service regulations, or
 - (4) Federal guidance, except as FTA determines otherwise in writing.
- e. You and your Applicant agree that the latest Charter Service Agreement selected in its latest annual Certifications and Assurances is incorporated by reference and made part of the Underlying Agreement accompanying its Award of federal assistance from FTA.
- f. You and your Applicant agree that:
 - (1) FTA may require corrective measures or impose remedies on it or any governmental authority or publicly owned operator that receives federal assistance from FTA that has demonstrated a pattern of violating of FTA's Charter Service regulations by:
 - (a) Conducting charter operations prohibited by federal transit laws and FTA's Charter Service regulations, or
 - (b) Otherwise violating its Charter Service Agreement selected in its latest annual Certifications and Assurances.
 - (2) These corrective measures and remedies may include:
 - (a) Barring your Applicant or any Third Party Participant operating public transportation under its Award that has provided prohibited charter service from receiving federal assistance from FTA,
 - (b) Withholding an amount of federal assistance as provided by Appendix D to FTA's Charter Service regulations, or (c) Any other appropriate remedy that may apply.

 - (1) Federal transit laws, 49 U.S.C. chapter 53,
 - (2) 23 U.S.C. §§ 133 or 142, or
 - (3) Any other Act that provides federal public transportation assistance, unless otherwise excepted.
 - b. Any Third Party Participant that receives federal assistance derived from:
 - (1) Federal transit laws, 49 U.S.C. chapter 53,

- (2) 23 U.S.C. §§ 133 or 142, or
- (3) Any other Act that provides federal public transportation assistance, unless otherwise excepted.
- 3. A Third Party Participant includes any:
 - a. Subrecipient at any tier,
 - b. Lessee,
 - c. Third Party Contractor or Subcontractor at any tier, and
 - d. Any other Third Party Participant in the Award.
- 4. You and your Applicant agree, and will obtain the agreement of any Third Party Participant, that it will not engage in school bus operations in competition with private operators of school buses, except as permitted under:
 - a. Federal transit laws, specifically 49 U.S.C. § 5323(f) and (g),
 - b. FTA regulations, "School Bus Operations," 49 CFR part 605, to the extent consistent with 49 U.S.C. § 5323(f) and (g),
 - c. Any other federal School Bus regulations, or
 - d. Federal guidance, except as FTA determines otherwise in writing.
- 5. You and your Applicant agree that the latest School Bus Agreement selected on its behalf in FTA's latest annual Certifications and Assurances is incorporated by reference and
- made part of the Underlying Agreement accompanying its Award of federal assistance.
- 6. You and your Applicant agree that after it is a Recipient, if it or any Third Party Participant has violated this School Bus Agreement, FTA may:
 - a. Bar your Applicant or Third Party Participant from receiving further federal assistance for public transportation, or
 - b. Require the Applicant or Third Party Participant to take such remedial measures as FTA considers appropriate.

CATEGORY 04. ROLLING STOCK REVIEWS AND BUS TESTING.

 - a. Your Applicant will conduct or cause to be conducted the required pre-award and postdelivery reviews of that rolling stock, and
 - b. It will maintain on file the Certifications required by 49 CFR part 663, subparts B, C, and D.

04.B. Bus Testing.

If your Applicant seeks federal assistance from FTA to acquire a new bus model, the Bus Testing Certifications in Category 04.B apply to your Applicant, except as FTA determines otherwise in writing.

On behalf of your Applicant, you certify that:

- 1. FTA's bus testing requirements apply to all acquisitions of new buses and new bus models that require bus testing as defined in FTA's Bus Testing regulations, and it will comply with:
 - a. 49 U.S.C. § 5318, and
 - b. FTA regulations, "Bus Testing," 49 CFR part 665.
- 2. As required by 49 CFR § 665.7, when acquiring the first bus of any new bus model or a bus model with a major change in components or configuration, your Applicant will not spend any federal assistance appropriated under 49 U.S.C. chapter 53 to acquire that new bus or new bus model until:
 - a. That new bus or new bus model has been tested at FTA's bus testing facility, and
 - b. It has received a copy of the test report prepared for that new bus or new bus model.
- 3. It will ensure that the new bus or new bus model that is tested has met the performance standards consistent with those regulations, including the:
 - a. Performance standards for:
 - (1) Maintainability,
 - (2) Reliability,
 - (3) Performance (including braking performance),
 - (4) Structural integrity,

 - (6) Emissions, and
 - (7) Noise, and
 - b. Minimum safety performance standards established under 49 U.S.C. § 5329, when issued.
- 4. It will ensure that the new bus or new bus model that is tested has received a passing aggregate test score under the "Pass/Fail" standard established by regulation.

CATEGORY 05. DEMAND RESPONSIVE SERVICE.

Before FTA may provide federal assistance to a public entity that operates demand responsive service for an Award to acquire a non-rail vehicle that is not accessible, you must select the Demand Responsive Service Certifications in Category 05, except as FTA determines otherwise in writing.

 - a. Provided in the most integrated setting feasible, and
 - b. Equivalent to the service it offers individuals without disabilities with respect to:
 - (1) Response time,
 - (2) Fares,
 - (3) Geographic service area,
 - (4) Hours and days of service,
 - (5) Restrictions on priorities based on trip purpose,
 - (6) Availability of information and reservation capability, and
 - (7) Constraints on capacity or service availability.

CATEGORY 06. INTELLIGENT TRANSPORTATION SYSTEMS.

Before FTA may provide federal assistance for an Award in support of an Intelligent Transportation System (ITS), you must select the Intelligent Transportation Systems Assurances in Category 06, except as FTA determines otherwise in writing.

Any provision of the Assurances in Category 06 that does not apply will not be enforced.

On behalf of your Applicant, you and your Applicant:

- 1. Understand that, as used in this Assurance, the term Intelligent Transportation System is defined to include technologies or systems of technologies that provide or significantly contribute to the provision of one or more Intelligent Transportation System (ITS) user services as defined in the "National ITS Architecture."
- 2. Assure that, as provided in 23 U.S.C. § 517(d), any Award that includes an ITS or related activity financed with appropriations made available from the Highway Trust Fund, including amounts made available to deploy ITS facilities or equipment, will conform to the appropriate regional ITS architecture, applicable standards, and protocols developed under 23 U.S.C. § 517(a) or (c), unless it obtains a waiver as provided in 23 U.S.C. § 517(d)(2).

CATEGORY 07. INTEREST AND FINANCING COSTS AND ACQUISITION OF CAPITAL ASSETS BY LEASE.

Before FTA may award federal assistance appropriated or made available under 49 U.S.C. chapter 53 to support the interest, financing, or leasing costs of any Award financed under the

Urbanized Area Formula Grants Program, Fixed Guideway Capital Investment Grants Program, any program to which the requirements of 49 U.S.C. § 5307 apply, or any other program as FTA may specify, you must select the Certifications in Category 07, except as FTA may determine otherwise in writing.

 - a. It is eligible to receive federal assistance for those expenses, and

STATEMENT OF INTENDED USE

The Municipality plans to use the Vehicle obtained from Pace Suburban Bus Service in a manner that will reduce the number of motor vehicles on the road within it's corporate limits with a resultant reduction in exhaust emissions and ground water contaminants. The vehicle will be used to provide transportation to the general public or specific groups of the general public such as senior citizens, people with disabilities, and/or low income.

The Municipality will not use the Vehicle to transport groups of children under the age of eight (8). The municipality understands that the vehicles cannot be used for charter operation, to transport school children or be used for a commercial enterprise. The municipality is required to follow all rules and regulations pertaining to safety and drug and alcohol testing.

Pace will review monthly the vehicle utilization in terms of the program goals and stated contractual intended use. Pace reserves the right to terminate this Agreement or substitute a more appropriate vehicle based on the vehicle utilization, in the event that the vehicle is not being used in a manner consistent with the program goals and stated contractual intended use.

Acceptance of a non-lift-equipped vehicle is contingent upon Municipality continuing its pre-existing service for individuals with disabilities, with vehicles other than the vehicle contracted for herein, for the duration of this contract. Should Municipality discontinue its existing service to individuals with disabilities at any time during the pendency of this contract, Municipality shall immediately notify Pace, who may, in its sole discretion either replace the vehicle(s) contracted for herein with one(s) that will enable the Municipality to continue service for individuals with disabilities, if equipment is available, or terminate this contract.

- Workers Compensation and Employer's Liability Insurance affording the following limits: Coverage A-Statutory Benefits and Coverage B-Employer's Liability-\$500,000 Each Accident, \$500,000 Disease-Each Employee, \$500,000 Disease-Policy Limit. Contractors not required by statute to obtain workers compensation insurance must demonstrate to Pace's satisfaction the financial capacity to indemnify Pace against claims from Contractor's employees.

Coverage provided shall be not less than that provided by the current ISO form CA 00 01 and contain <u>Symbol 1= Any "Auto"</u> for the definition of covered autos. The covered auto designation symbols on the Municipal Participant Auto policy shall also include <u>"8"-Hired Autos</u> and <u>"9"- Non-owned Autos</u>. <u>Uninsured Motorist</u> and <u>Underinsured Motorist</u> Coverage shall be included at the minimum coverage limits mandated by the State of Illinois.
- **Umbrella Liability Insurance** affording limits of not less than \$4,000,000 each occurrence and \$4,000,000 aggregate coverage. Such umbrella coverage shall contain the following policy provisions/endorsements: defense, investigation, and supplementary payments "outside" or "in addition to" the policy limits, 30 day Notice of Cancellation, Definition of

"Who is an insured" shall include "Any person or organization" that is an insured under any policy of underlying coverage. The Municipal participant must maintain the underlying insurance as scheduled during the entire contract term.

Due to the variation in policy types, coverage afforded, and exclusions, Pace requires that a copy of the actual policy be provided to us for a complete review prior to acceptance of the insurance terms or exhibit that make up this agreement. The minimal liability limits required for this policy are \$1,000,000.

Automobile Physical Damage -with coverage afforded for <u>Comprehensive perils</u> including losses from fire, theft, vandalism, falling or flying objects, malicious mischief, lightning, windstorm, water, flood, earthquake, hail, impact with animals, missiles, riot, civil commotion, rising water, and breakage of glass (other than when caused by collision), and; <u>Collision perils</u>, including upset or collision with another vehicle, person, or any object including the ground or highway; impact with an object on or in the ground. The Physical Damage coverage limit (valuation) shall be based on the Actual Cash Value (ACV) of the vehicle(s). The Certificate of Insurance shall also name Pace Suburban Bus Service as the Loss Payee.

The Municipalities' General Liability and Auto Liability insurance shall include the following Additional Insured/Additional Party language and endorsements:

a. The insurance policies shall be endorsed to provide that the <u>Suburban Bus Division of</u> <u>the Regional Transportation Authority d/b/a Pace, and the Regional Transportation</u> <u>Authority and their employees are named as Additional Insured for "liability for</u> <u>'bodily injury' 'property damage' and 'personal injury' caused in whole or in part, by</u> <u>your acts or omissions or the acts or omissions of those acting on your behalf: (a) in the</u> <u>performance of your ongoing operations; or (b) for claims brought on behalf of your</u> <u>employees, agents, or subcontractor and their employees."</u>

In addition, Pace Suburban Bus Service shall be provided with (1) Blanket Additional Insured wording directly from the Municipal Participant's General Liability insurance policy **or** (2) a completed CG 20 10 07 04 **or** (3) a CG 2026 Designated Organization endorsement naming Pace Suburban Bus Service as the designated organization. Through the issuance of these endorsements, Pace shall receive coverage for "ongoing operations" and "completed operations".

b. The Municipal participant's insurance must contain the standard **Separation of Insureds provision** or an endorsement providing that, except with respect to limits, the insurance applies separately to each insured.

"Other Insurance" policy provision

Within 10 days of contract award and prior to delivery of Pace-Owned equipment, the insurance company, or its authorized representative, shall submit an insurance certificate that meets or exceed the requirements contained in this exhibit and provide Pace with thirty (30) days prior written notice of material change, policy cancellation, or a 10 day notice of cancellation for non-payment of premium. Contractor's failure to carry or document required insurance shall constitute a breach of the contract. Any failure by Pace to demand or receive proof of insurance coverage shall not constitute a waiver of Contractor's obligation to obtain the required insurance. The Contractor shall require all subcontractors to carry the insurance required herein and comply with these requirements. Contractor expressly agrees that these insurance provisions in no way limit Contractor's responsibilities under other provisions of the Contract, including the hold harmless and indemnification clause. Contractor or Contractor's insurance agent shall, upon request by Pace, furnish a copy of the insurance policy addressed to the Purchasing Section Manager. The Contractor shall not commence work herein until he has obtained the required insurance and has received Pace's approval.

BACKGROUND:

The ComEd Green Region Program offers small grants to local governments and non-profits in our region for the protection and improvement of open space. Potentially covered expenses include land acquisition, planning, and physical site improvements such as passive recreational facilities and plant and animal community restoration. The grant is limited to \$10,000 maximum, and requires an equal local match. Grant recipients may apply for additional grants on an annual basis.

In 2013 the Village was awarded a ComEd Green Region grant to assist in the effort to clean up and remove trash, debris, and invasive landscape plant materials from the site. The grant also helped fund the development of a conceptual Master Plan for the site. In 2017 the Village was awarded an additional grant to for work associated with the restoration of native plant and animal communities in the Nature Center and the surrounding area.

The Village is currently working on plans for the Eagle Ridge Green Infrastructure Project. This project would be a good match for the ComEd Green Region grant as it would focus heavily on the establishment of pollinator habitat as well as incorporate interpretation components, such as educational site signage, that inform the public about both pollinators and green infrastructure. The total project cost is estimated at \$85,000 and is intended to help address flooding issues near the Eagle Ridge Park and Eagle Ridge subdivision through a comprehensive green infrastructure approach.

The attached resolution in support of the ComEd Green Region Program grant application is now before the Village Board for consideration.

BUDGET IMPACT:

The ComEd grant application requires a resolution of support from the Village Board approving the submission as well as approval to utilizate the Tree Preservation and Green Infrastructure Account funds for a local match. Matching funds for this project are available in the Tree Preservation and Green Infrastructure Account (TPGIA) # 010-0000-223100.
